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Time Warner Cable News / Siena College 19th Congressional District Poll: Gibson Maintains Huge 23-Point Lead Over Eldridge

Voters Strongly View Incumbent Favorably; Divided on the Challenger

Loudonville, NY. A week before Election Day, Republican Representative Chris Gibson continues to hold a commanding lead over Democrat Sean Eldridge. Gibson holds a 58-35 percent lead, virtually unchanged from his 57-33 percent lead seven weeks ago, according to a new Time Warner Cable News/Siena College poll of likely 19th C.D. voters released today. By a 60-25 percent margin, voters have a favorable view of Gibson, whereas Eldridge divides voters, with 33 percent viewing him favorably and 35 percent unfavorably.

60 percent of independents, and even has the support of more than one-quarter of Democrats, all virtually the same as the previous Time Warner Cable News/Siena poll,ö Greenberg said. õHe maintains a 13-point lead in the Ulster/Dutchess portion of the district and better than two-to-one leads in the other regions. He has a dominating 42-pont lead with men and leads among women by nine points. He leads by more than 20 points with voters 55 and older and has an even larger lead with voters younger than 55,ö Greenberg said.

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õAs mailboxes across the 19th C.D. have been stuffed with literature promoting and attacking each candidate, and as airways have been flooded with both warm and fuzzy commercials and attack ads, Eldridge has become known to more voters. Unfortunately for him, there are as many voters that view him unfavorably as view him

favorably,ö Greenberg said. õGibson, who was well known throughout the district at the beginning of the campaign, continues to hold a better than two-to-one favorability rating.

õWhile Eldridge is viewed strongly favorably by Democrats and strongly unfavorably by Republicans, Gibson is viewed overwhelmingly favorably by Republicans and independents, even as Democrats are closely divided on their view of Gibson,ö Greenberg said.

Cuomo & Astorino, Both Viewed Unfavorably, are Running Virtually Dead Even

õRob Astorino is viewed favorably by only 35 percent of voters, while Andrew Cuomo is viewed favorably by only 37 percent. Given that, it is no surprise that the race for governor in this district is a toss-up, as 39 percent support Astorino and 38 percent support Cuomo. Green Party candidate Howie Hawkins, viewed favorably by 13 percent of voters, has the support of 14 percent, ö Greenberg said. õBoth major party candidates are viewed more unfavorably than favorably and it appears that for at least some voters this is a ±hold your nose ø and vote for the candidate you dislike less election.ö

õGibson won his first re-election two years ago in a close, presidential election year, race. He appears to be coasting to a much easier re-election this year,ö Greenberg said. õThe millions spent in the last few months on both sides of the political aisle have had a negligible effect on this race. Voters knew, liked and supported Gibson back in September and with just days until voters cast their ballots, they continue to know, like and support Gibson. To call Eldridge¢s challenge in the next week a Herculean task is clearly an understatement.ö

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This Time Warner Cable News/Siena College 19^{th} C.D. was conducted October 22-24, 2014 by telephone calls to 727 likely voters drawn from a list of registered voters. Determined by a stringent screen, likely voters were statistically adjusted to reflect historic turnout by gender and age, and by party registration. It has a margin of error of \pm 3.6 percentage points.
