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**Siena College Poll:**

**Cuomo Has Commanding Lead over Paladino Among Likely Voters**

About 60% Say Paladino is 'Loose Cannon' & Have Unfavorable View of Him  
***Voters: Paladino Equal to Cuomo on Taxes; Cuomo Better on All Other Issues***  
*By Better than 3:1, Cuomo Campaign More Positive; Paladino Campaign More Negative*

**Loudonville, NY.** Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Cuomo has a commanding 56-32 percent lead over Republican Carl Paladino among likely voters. Fifty-nine percent of voters have an unfavorable view of Paladino and 61 percent agree with the statement that he 'is a loose cannon, who doesn't have the temperament to be governor.' Voters see Cuomo as better on all issues, other than property taxes and state taxes, on which voters see them as virtually equal, according to a Siena College poll of likely New York voters released today.

"With four weeks until voters go to the polls, Cuomo remains in a very strong position to be elected New York's next governor. Cuomo leads Paladino by 24 points among likely voters in a head-to-head matchup with both candidates on three ballot lines. Cuomo has a huge 70-17 percent lead in New York City, a strong 54-35 lead in the downstate suburbs and upstate voters are nearly evenly divided with Cuomo having 45 percent support and Paladino 43 percent," said Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg.

"Cuomo leads Paladino by 67 points among Democrats, 11 points among independent voters, and trails Paladino by 34 points among Republicans. Cuomo has the support of twice as many Republicans, 25 percent, as Paladino gets from Democrats, 12 percent. Those voters favorable to the Tea Party movement support Paladino 69-15 percent, while those unfavorable to the Tea Party back Cuomo 89-4 percent," Greenberg said. "Republicans and upstaters in this survey make up a higher percentage of likely voters than both groups account for among registered New York voters."

Among Paladino voters, 57 percent say they are absolutely certain to vote for him with no chance that they will change their minds and another 38 percent say they are fairly certain. Sixty-four percent of Cuomo voters say they are absolutely certain to support him, with 30 percent saying they are fairly certain.

Cuomo is viewed favorably by 56 percent of voters and unfavorably by 37 percent. Paladino is viewed favorably by 30 percent and unfavorably by 59 percent.

“Cuomo continues to enjoy a very strong favorability rating among New York voters,” Greenberg said. “On the other hand, while Paladino has quickly become very well known among New York voters, it is not in a good way. By a nearly two-to-one margin – including a majority of upstaters and nearly two-thirds of self-described moderates – likely voters have an unfavorable view of Paladino.

“While a majority of likely voters doesn’t think Cuomo’s too much of an Albany insider and a majority do

believe that Cuomo’s experience is what’s needed now, more voters disagree than agree with the view that Paladino’s business, not political, experience will help New York,” Greenberg said.

“Stunningly, however, by a 61-34 percent margin, likely voters say that Paladino is a ‘loose cannon,’ lacking the temperament to be

governor. That is up significantly from two weeks ago when 41 percent of registered voters agreed that he was a loose cannon and 42 percent disagreed. A majority of voters from every region agree with this statement.”

Jobs (30 percent) is the most important issue for the next governor to focus on, followed by state budget deficits (17 percent), state taxes (12 percent), property taxes (11 percent), state government ethics (11 percent), education (10 percent), and health care (6 percent).

“When it comes to job creation, education, reforming state government ethics, addressing the state’s budget, and health care, voters strongly believe

that Cuomo will be more effective,” Greenberg said. “On the tax issues, however, both property taxes and state taxes, voters are nearly evenly divided between Paladino and Cuomo.”

Voters, by a 59-18 percent margin, say Cuomo, not Paladino, is running the more positive campaign for governor. Similarly, by a 61-20 percent margin, voters say Paladino is running the more negative campaign. Even a plurality of Republicans says Cuomo is running the more positive campaign and Paladino the more negative campaign.

“At this point, likely voters don’t look at Paladino favorably. With the exception of taxes, they don’t think he will be as effective as Cuomo in addressing the issues, and they overwhelmingly say he’s running the more negative campaign. Furthermore, by a two-to-one margin, voters say Cuomo as governor, more than Paladino, would make them say they are ‘proud to be a New Yorker. Paladino has a lot of work to do but he successfully came from behind in the Republican primary to overwhelmingly win that race,” Greenberg said.

“But the time to Election Day is slowly slipping away. We know that four weeks is a long time in a political campaign – after all, just look at how interesting the last week has been – but Paladino has to convince voters that he’d be a better governor than Cuomo. As of early October, that certainly appears to be a daunting task,” Greenberg said.

Half of likely voters, 50 percent, have an unfavorable view of the Tea Party movement, compared to 40 percent who have a favorable view. Republicans view the Tea Party overwhelmingly favorably, 65-24 percent, Democrats overwhelmingly unfavorably, 19-71 percent, and independents favorably 50-40 percent.

“Tea Party supporters are certainly with Paladino by a strong 69-15 percent margin. Conversely, among those who have an unfavorable view of the Tea Party, Cuomo has an even larger 89-4 percent lead,” Greenberg said.

“It’s also worth noting that likely voters in seven of eight hotly contested state senate districts polled by Siena favor Cuomo over Paladino – one by five points, two by 16 points, and four by more than 20 points. Only in one district in Erie County does Paladino lead Cuomo, albeit by a large 35-point margin,” Greenberg said.

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**This SRI survey was conducted October 3-4, 2010 by telephone calls to 636 likely New York State registered voters. It has a margin of error of  $\pm 3.9$  percentage points. A stringent likely voter screen was applied to a representative sample of 998 registered voters.
