Siena College Poll: Occupy Wall Street Has the Attention of Most New Yorkers

By Two-to-One, Voters Say Those Engaged in OWS Represent the 99% Opposed to the Corruption of the 1%, Rather than Out-of-work Young People with Potential to Cause Riots

More Voters Would Opt to Join Occupy Wall Street over the Tea Party Obama Has Large Double Digit Leads over Perry, Romney, Cain

Loudonville, **NY**. Two-thirds of voters statewide are paying a great deal (24 percent) or at least some (42 percent) attention to the ongoing Occupy Wall Street demonstrations that have been taking place in lower Manhattan and in other cities around the nation, according to a new Siena College Research Institute poll of registered voters released today. By a better than two-to-one majority, voters say "they represent the 99 percent of people that will no longer tolerate the greed and corruption of the remaining one percent," compared to "they are mostly out-of-work young people copying the protestors in Cairo, with the potential to cause those kinds of riots here."

By 49-28 percent, voters say they would join the Occupy Wall Street movement over the Tea Party movement if they had to join one, while 16 percent volunteered that they would not join either. A plurality of voters thinks the demonstrations have received the right amount of media coverage, with about one-quarter each saying too much coverage or not enough coverage. Forty-nine percent have a favorable view of the Occupy Wall Street movement, compared to 38 percent who view it unfavorably. The Tea Party movement has 28-60 percent unfavorable rating, while Wall Street has a 24-67 percent unfavorable rating with New York voters.

President Obama's favorability rating inched up slightly over the last month, while his job performance inched down slightly. Voters remain divided on whether they would prefer to re-elect the President or would prefer "someone else," although Obama has large double digit leads over potential Republican challengers Texas Governor Rick Perry, former Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney and businessman Herman Cain.

"In the last few weeks, the Occupy Wall Street movement has taken on a life of its own, gaining the attention of voters across New York, although more so downstate than upstate, and most tend to view the movement far more favorably than they view the Tea Party movement or Wall Street itself," said Siena pollster Steven Greenberg.

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"When asked to choose between two descriptions of the Occupy Wall Street participants, 58 percent side with how the protesters describe themselves – the 99 percent who will no longer tolerate the greed of the one percent – while only 27 percent choose to describe them as mostly out-of-work young people with the potential to cause riots," Greenberg said. "A majority of voters from virtually every party, region and age and income group sides with the '99 percent' description, although only a plurality of Republicans and downstate suburbanites do so.

"Nearly half of voters – including a majority of Democrats, women, those from New York City, African Americans and Latinos, those 55 years of age and older, and those earning more than \$50,000 per year – have a favorable view of the Occupy Wall Street movement. Only Republicans and conservatives have majorities with an unfavorable view, along with a plurality of suburbanites. Independents are evenly divided," Greenberg said.

"Conversely, only majorities of Republicans and conservatives view the Tea Party favorably. A majority of every other demographic group has an unfavorable view of the Tea Party," Greenberg said. "And when it comes to Wall Street, a strong majority of every demographic group has an unfavorable view.

"Given how voters view both sides, it's no surprise that a majority or plurality of every demographic group would opt to join the Occupy Wall Street movement over the Tea Party movement – with the exception of Republicans and conservatives – if they had to join one of the two movements," Greenberg said.

Obama's Ratings Hold Fairly Steady; Continues Big Leads over Republicans

Obama has a 55-43 percent favorability rating (up from 52-45 percent last month) and a 38-62 percent job performance rating (down from 40-61 percent). Perry has an 18-53 percent unfavorable rating (down from 21-45 percent). Romney has a 34-45 percent unfavorable rating (up from 30-46 percent). Cain has a 25-32 percent unfavorable rating (it was 12-25 in August). Obama leads Perry 58-31 percent (up from 56-33 percent last month), he leads Romney 55-37 percent (down from 56-36 percent), and he leads Cain 58-32 percent.

"The President's ratings continue to be very strong with Democrats, very negative with Republicans, and virtually evenly divided among independents," Greenberg said. "However, New York has not voted for a Republican for president since 1984, and Obama continues to have leads of between 18 and 27 points against three potential Republican challengers. Obama does better with Democrats than any of the challengers do with Republicans, and he leads among independents against all three by margins of between 13 and 21 points."

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This Siena College Poll was conducted October 10-12, 2011 by telephone calls to 800 New York State registered voters. It has a margin of error of <u>+</u> 3.5 percentage points. Data was statistically adjusted by age, party and gender to ensure representativeness. Sampling was conducted via random digit dialing to landline and cell phones weighted to reflect known population patterns.
