Siena New York Poll:

Spitzer Expands Lead Over Faso to 53 Points; Beats Faso by 11 Points Among Republicans

AG Race Tightens – Cuomo Lead Down to 15 Points; Green Would Beat Pirro by Four Points

Giuliani & McCain Beat Clinton & Gore in NYS '08 Match-ups

Loudonville, NY – With 13 weeks until the November election, Attorney General Eliot Spitzer has expanded his lead to a four-to-one edge over former Assembly Minority Leader John Faso, according to a new Siena (College) Research Institute poll of New York voters released today. The few voters who saw the Democratic gubernatorial debate give a clear advantage to Spitzer. The Attorney General race is tightening. And leading Republicans would beat leading Democrats in New York if the 2008 presidential election were held today

"Eliot Spitzer continues to expand his lead over John Faso to historic proportions," said Steven Greenberg, spokesman for the Siena New York Poll. "Spitzer has an 11 point lead over Faso among Republicans and is close to having the support of half of GOP voters. Faso's support has fallen to 17 percent of New York voters, and while he is 'strongest' upstate, he only gets one of every five upstate votes.

"While three months out is too early to call an election, the fat lady's warming up her voice and John Faso has his work cut out if he wants to keep her from singing," Greenberg said.

Spitzer leads Faso 70-17 percent. He leads among Republicans 45-34 percent. Spitzer's favorable rating is the highest it's ever been at 71-15 percent, while Faso continues to be unknown to two-thirds of voters and has a favorable rating of 16-15 percent among those who have an opinion of him. If the race featured Nassau County Executive Tom Suozzi against Faso, he would lead 40-22 percent

"Suozzi claimed victory in the recent debate. But among the 11 percent of New York voters who saw the debate, Spitzer was the clear-cut winner by a three-to-one margin," Greenberg said. "Suozzi may talk the talk but voters think that Spitzer walks the walk."

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In the race for Attorney General, Andrew Cuomo saw his 26 point lead over Jeanine Pirro tighten to 15 points, 50-35 percent. If Mark Green is the Democratic candidate, he leads Pirro 41-37 percent. Cuomo's favorable rating is 44-35 percent (down from 47-29 percent in June). Green has 30-21 percent favorable rating. Pirro has 30-29 percent favorable rating.

"The race for Attorney General is shaping up to be the closest race this fall," Greenberg said. "Cuomo has the early lead in the primary and the general elections but his numbers are falling and Pirro has recovered the Republican base and now leads Cuomo among Republicans 62-25 percent."

In prospective 2008 presidential races, former New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani and Senator John McCain would both beat either Senator Hillary Clinton or former Vice President Al Gore. Giuliani beats Clinton 48-42 percent and Gore 48-44 percent. McCain top Clinton 46-42 percent and Gore 47-44 percent.

"Two formidable Republicans have the early edge over two heavyweight Democrats in what has long been seen as one of the 'bluest' states in the nation.," Greenberg said. "And the fact that Gore does better than Hillary against either Rudy or McCain will certainly put the pressure on New York's junior senator to try and run up a big victory in her re-election battle this fall."

In the race for the Senate, Clinton continues to lead former Yonkers Mayor John Spencer 58-32 percent and former Reagan Administration official Kathleen "KT" McFarland 58-28 percent. Clinton has 55-38 percent favorable rating. Spencer and McFarland are unknown to more than three quarters of the voters.

When asked what one issue should be the new Governor's top priority, New York voters say taxes (24 percent), followed by health care (20 percent), public education (16 percent), jobs (15 percent), state spending (10 percent), energy (six percent), and crime (three percent). While taxes is the top issue of only one in ten New York City voters (ranking fourth), it is the most important issue for nearly one-third of voters, followed by jobs at 20 percent.

Governor George Pataki remains unpopular with New York voters, having a negative favorable/unfavorable rating of 41-51 percent. And New York voters continue to believe the state is heading in the wrong direction (47 percent) vs. heading on the right track (29 percent), this is particularly true upstate (62-20 percent).

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This SRI survey was conducted July 31-August 3, 2006 by telephone calls to 623 New York State registered voters.
