## **Half of NYers Describe State Fiscal Condition as Poor**

### ***Special Session Priority: Voters Equally Divided Among Job Creation, Property Taxes and Budget Deficit***

**As Paterson's Rating with Voters Continues to Edge Up, Two-thirds Agree with Governor This Is Worst Fiscal Condition Since 1970's**

**Loudonville, NY.** With the Legislature returning to Albany tomorrow, 48 percent of New York voters describe the state's fiscal condition as poor and another 37 percent call it fair, while only 13 percent describe it as good, according to a new Siena (College) Research Institute poll released today. Nearly two-thirds agree with Governor David Paterson that the state's fiscal condition is the worst it's been since the New York City fiscal crisis in the 1970's. Voters are divided over the single biggest issue they want the Governor and Legislature to address this week, with property taxes and job creation each receiving 26 percent support, while addressing the state's budget deficit gets 24 percent. Paterson's standing with voters is the best it's ever been.

"New Yorkers see a very bleak fiscal picture for the state, with 85 percent of voters describing the state's fiscal condition as poor or fair," said Steven Greenberg, spokesman for the Siena New York Poll. "And 65 percent of voters, including more than three-quarters of upstaters, agree with the Governor that this is the worst fiscal situation the state has faced in more than three decades.

"While 43 percent of voters say they are very or somewhat confident that the Governor and Legislature will improve the state's fiscal condition this year, 55 percent of voters tell Siena that they are not at all or not very confident that state leaders will effectively address the fiscal health of New York this year," Greenberg said.

When given four choices for the top priority in this week's special session, 26 percent said property taxes, 26 percent said job creation, 24 percent said the state budget deficit, and 11 percent said government reform, while another 11 percent volunteered another choice. Job creation is the top choice of Democrats, independent voters, young, African American and New York City voters. Property taxes was the top choice of Republicans, suburbanites and older voters.

“While voters are divided over what the Legislature and Governor should do this week, they are nearly unanimous in opposing tax increases to close the budget gap, with 80 percent wanting to see spending cut and only 10 percent saying raise taxes,” Greenberg said.

When asked which of the two largest expenditures in the state budget – education and health care – should be cut voters were divided with 26 percent saying health care and 24 percent education. Twenty-one percent volunteered that neither of those should be cut, 10 percent said something else, four percent said cut salaries and another four percent said cut both education and health care.

Similar to last month, voters overwhelmingly support a property tax cap 66-23 percent (69-20 percent in July) and a property tax circuit breaker 75-18 percent (75-17 percent last month). Voters continue to support the circuit breaker over the cap if only one action is taken 58-33 percent (up from 52-36 percent last month). And 60 percent of voters say they are not at all or not very confident that state leaders will address the property tax issue this year, while 36 percent say they are very or somewhat confident that it will be addressed.

Paterson’s favorable/unfavorable rating is 59-16 percent, (57-15 percent in July). He has a positive job performance rating of 52-35 percent, (48-39 percent in July). Thirty-five percent of voters say they would elect him governor in 2010, while 26 percent they would prefer someone else (34-27 percent in July). In hypothetical 2010 gubernatorial match-ups, Paterson loses to New York City Mayor Mike Bloomberg 44-36 percent (45-37 percent in July) and beats former Mayor Rudy Giuliani 48-38 percent (47-40 percent in July).

“Despite the state’s fiscal picture – or maybe because of the way he’s talking to voters about it – David Paterson has the best favorable and job performance ratings with voters he’s ever had,” Greenberg said.

The race for President continues to tighten in New York, with Democrat Barack Obama leading Republican John McCain 47-39 percent, down from 50-37 percent in July and 51-33 percent in June. Obama has a 54-34 percent favorable rating and McCain has a 49-41 percent rating.

“While New York has not gone ‘red’ in a presidential race since 1984, Obama’s lead over McCain has fallen from 18 points in June to just eight points today,” Greenberg said. “Certainly the dynamic in the race will change with the two conventions and the selection by both candidates of vice presidential running mates.”

A plurality of New York voters continues to support seeing the State Senate switch control from Republicans to Democrats in November by a 47-42 percent margin, down slightly from 48-40 percent last month. Three-time gubernatorial candidate Tom Golisano, who says he will be financially supporting senate campaigns this year has a 22-20 percent favorable rating, although it is stronger upstate, 37-21 percent.
