Circuit Breaker & Gas Tax Cut Top Property Tax Cap

Gov 2010: Rudy Crushes Bloomberg with Reps; Paterson Beats Cuomo with Dems; Bloomberg Strongest in General Election

While Most New Yorkers Plan to Remain in NY, Many Want Out

Loudonville, NY. While New York voters strongly support both a property tax cap and a property tax “circuit breaker,” which ensures that property taxes do not exceed a certain percentage of a homeowner’s income, when forced to choose between the two, a majority prefer the circuit breaker, according to a new Siena (College) Research Institute poll released today. More voters would rather see New York eliminate 32 cents of state gas taxes than cap property tax increases. In the 2010 gubernatorial race, Republicans support former Mayor Rudy Giuliani over current Mayor Mike Bloomberg; Democrats prefer Governor David Paterson to Attorney General Andrew Cuomo, and Bloomberg leads either Democrat, while both Democrats best Giuliani.

The new Siena Poll also shows that while most New Yorkers are not planning on leaving the state anytime soon – if at all – a significant number of voters would like to leave as soon as possible, or if conditions in New York do not improve. The presumptive Democratic presidential nominee, Senator Barack Obama, continues to have a double digit lead over Senator John McCain, the presumptive Republican nominee, with supporters of both candidates reasonably certain they will not change their minds before November.

“New Yorkers overwhelmingly want tax relief. Property tax cap to limit increases? Yes, 69 percent. Circuit breaker to limit what they pay in property taxes? Yes, 75 percent,” said Steven Greenberg, spokesman for the Siena New York Poll. “But if they can only have one form of property tax relief, 52 percent – including a majority of Democrats, Republicans, upstaters and downstaters – say they want the circuit breaker. Yet, only one-third of voters are confident the Governor and Legislature will tackle the property tax issue this year.

“When asked their preference between a property tax cap and a 32-cent per gallon reduction of state gas taxes, voters are almost evenly divided with 49 percent saying eliminate the gas tax and 45 percent wanting a property tax cap. Democrats and New York City voters prefer gas tax reductions. Republicans and downstate suburbanites want the property tax cap. Upstaters are evenly divided,” Greenberg said.

“Looking ahead to 2010, Paterson has opened a 30 point lead over Cuomo among Democrats, up from 12 points last month,” Greenberg said. “On the Republican side, Mayor Rudy has a 35 point lead over Mayor Mike.

“But among all voters, Bloomberg beats Paterson

by eight points and Cuomo by 12 points, while Giuliani loses to Paterson by seven points and Cuomo by five points. Where Bloomberg wins handily among independent voters and captures a sizeable number of Democrats against Paterson or Cuomo, Giuliani does better than Bloomberg with Republicans, but doesn’t do nearly as well with Democrats or independents,” Greenberg said.

Paterson has a 57-15 percent favorable/unfavorable rating, virtually unchanged from last month. His job performance rating is up to 48 percent positive to 39 percent negative. Cuomo’s 57-23 percent favorable rating is also virtually unchanged, as is his 55-35 percent job performance rating. Bloomberg’s favorable rating, 64-20 percent, is also consistent from last month. Giuliani has a 51-39 percent favorable rating, comparable to last September and up from 44-48 percent in January at the end of his presidential campaign.

Obama’s lead over McCain is 50-37 percent, down from 51-33 percent in June. Seventy three percent of Obama voters say they are absolutely certain not to switch to McCain, with another 22 percent fairly certain, while 61 percent of McCain voters say they are absolutely certain not to switch to Obama, with another 30 percent fairly certain. Obama has a 57-32 percent favorable rating and McCain has a 45-42 percent rating.

Seventeen percent of voters say they will never move out of New York; 37 percent say they currently have no plans to move; 27 percent say they may move in retirement but not before; nine percent say they will move if conditions in New York do not get better; and seven percent would like to move out as quickly as possible.

“While 81 percent of voters do not plan on leaving New York, seven percent would love to leave tomorrow,” Greenberg said. “If seven percent of New Yorkers left the state, it would be an exodus of well over one million people, with nearly two million more threatening to leave if conditions in the state do not improve.

“Despite tough economic conditions and falling consumer confidence, nearly as many voters, 36 percent, think the state is on the right track as feel the state is headed in the wrong direction, 39 percent,” Greenberg said. “Only six percent of those who think the state is on the right track want to leave New York now or if conditions don’t improve, while 24 percent who feel the state is headed in the wrong direction want out.”
