Clinton & Obama Strengthen Leads Over McCain

NYers Seriously Impacted by Gas Prices; Want Gas Tax Relief

Voters Strongly Oppose Pay Raise for Governor; Oppose Pay Raise for Judges; Nearly Split on Pay Raise for Legislators

Loudonville, NY. Both Democratic candidates widened their lead over Senator John McCain, with Senator Hillary Clinton leading 51-39 percent and Senator Barack Obama leading 49-38 percent, according to a new Siena (College) Research Institute poll of registered voters released today. The Siena New York poll shows that for the vast majority of New Yorkers gas prices are having a very or somewhat serious on their financial condition. Most voters support a temporary state reduction in gas prices, although fewer than one in five believes they would see a reduction in gas taxes fully reflected in the price they pay at the pump. Voters are overwhelmingly opposed to a pay raise for the Governor, strongly opposed to a judicial pay raise, and only a small plurality, opposed to a pay raise for state legislators.

“New York voters appear to be moving back in the blue column, providing Senators Clinton and Obama with double digit leads over Senator McCain,” said Steven Greenberg, spokesman for the Siena New York Poll.

“New York’s senator has a 51-39 percent lead and the man from Illinois leads 49-38 percent. While Obama is stronger than Clinton against McCain with African American voters, Clinton does better than Obama with Latino and women voters.

“New York Democrats see both as equally strong against McCain. And while most New York Democrats think Hillary should keep fighting for the nomination, although by a smaller margin than in several national polls, more than 40 percent of Democrats think she should drop out now.” Greenberg said.

Fifty-seven percent of voters say increases in gas prices are having a “very serious impact” on their financial condition, while another 29 percent say those increases are having a “somewhat serious impact.” Support for reducing the state gas tax by 32 cents per gallon for the summer is supported by 61 percent and opposed by 35 percent. Only 18 percent believe they would see a 32 cent drop in the price they pay, while 43 percent think they would see about half of that and one-third believing that consumers wouldn’t benefit at all.

“New Yorkers clearly feel that filling up the tank has become a pain in the gas. Upstate and downstate, City and suburbs, gas prices are a major financial concern for the vast majority of New Yorkers. Nearly half of voters lay the blame at the feet of the President and the oil companies but it is clear they are looking for help,” Greenberg said. “While three in five New York voters support the state reducing gas taxes, one-third of voters don’t think they’d see any relief at the pump and another 43 percent think they’d only see about half of it.”

“When it comes to elected officials, the more they earn, the more opposed voters are to giving them a raise,” Greenberg said. “Judges have been loudly arguing for a raise but voters don’t think they’ve made the case.”

After two months in office, 35 percent of voters still do not have an opinion about Governor David Paterson. His favorable/unfavorable rating is 48-17 percent (virtually unchanged from 48-18 percent last month). More voters, however, rate his job performance positively, 40-32 percent (up from 35-34 percent last month). He currently leads Attorney General Andrew Cuomo (56-25 percent favorable rating) 42 to 29 percent in a hypothetical 2010 gubernatorial primary. However, in a general election match-up, he trails New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg (65-19 percent favorable rating) 45 percent to 36 percent.

“Having not been through a campaign with millions of dollars of television exposure, the Governor is still in the process of introducing himself to voters. Many still do not know him, but those that do generally like him and a plurality think he’s doing a positive job,” Greenberg said.

Nearly half of voters, 48 percent, agree that if Democrats gain control of the Senate it will make state government more effective, while 39 percent agree that Republicans keeping control of the Senate provides checks and balances. In March the Republican argument topped the Democratic argument 47-45 percent.

“Democrats want to see the Democrats in charge and Republicans want to see Republicans keep control. Independent voters are evenly divided. Clearly, a handful of State Senate races are going to be the most hotly contested and closely watched elections in New York this year,” Greenberg said.
