Loudonville, NY. Incumbent Republican Representative Peter Roskam is virtually tied with his Democratic challenger, businessman Sean Casten, as he holds a small 45-44 percent advantage, according to a new New York Times Upshot/Siena College poll of likely voters in Illinois' 6th Congressional District. Casten has a 30-18 percent favorability rating, compared to a 36-38 percent favorability rating for Roskam.

Likely voters in this suburban Chicago district prefer Democrats rather than Republicans control the House of Representatives next year by a seven-point margin, 51-44 percent. Voters give President Trump a negative job approval rating with 36 percent approving the job he is doing and 57 percent disapproving.

This New York Times Upshot/Siena College IL 06 survey was conducted September 4-6, 2018 by telephone calls in English to 512 likely IL 06 voters. This poll has a margin of error of ± 4.7 percentage points. Calls were made to a stratified weighted sample of voters from the L-2 Voter list via both land and cell phones. A likely-to-vote probability was computed for each respondent based on their stated likelihood to vote as well as by virtue of the imputation of a turnout probability score based on past voting behavior. This combined probability to vote score was applied as a weight along with a weight that considered party, age, race/ethnicity, education, region within the district and gender.
