This Newsday/Siena College survey was conducted October 2-6, 2022 by telephone calls in English to 993 likely voters in Long Island. Telephone sampling was conducted via a stratified dual frame probability sample of landline (ASDE) and cell phone (Dynata) telephone numbers within Long Island weighted to reflect known population patterns. Data was statistically adjusted by age, race/ethnicity, political party, regional vote pattern in the 2020 election, gender, a measure of likelihood derived from the composition of the electorate in 2014 and 2018 to ensure representativeness. It has an overall margin of error of + 3.7 percentage points including the design effects resulting from weighting. The Siena College Research Institute, directed by Donald Levy, Ph.D., conducts political, economic, social, and cultural research primarily in NYS.
